Dear Friends,

Eddie Rickenbacker, the great WWI American fighter pilot, ace, and leader of the 'Hat-in-the-Ring' squadron was shot down in the Pacific during the Second World War. Adrift in a life raft for a long time with several others, he survived extraordinary odds to return to his country, and to continue his service.

He wrote a book about surviving his deadly time adrift at sea, with no certainty of rescue and he titled his book, <u>We Thought We Heard</u> <u>the Angels Sing.</u>

I read it when I was boy, loved it, and never forgot it. It



was story of real heroism and endurance in the face of a future of which, neither he nor his fellow survivors could be sure, but for which they could only hope. Not a story about battles, and fighting, and weapons, and glory, it simply showed how these men faced death, endured, and survived – together. And how vividly aware they were that they were facing eternity. Your life and my life, and our life together may not mirror the dramatic struggle Rickenbacker faced. I suspect though, that we have faced, and may face situations that remind us that we are not all-powerful, and at the mercy of forces greater than ourselves.

We are not alone at times like these. We are together – with friends, in God's church, and with God. Sometimes, all we have is endurance and the will to go on. Sometimes, all we can do is hope to be rescued. A lot of life is beyond our control. Our response, though, is within our control. Never give up. God will not give up on you.

Summer Activities

There are so many things going on at Holy Cross right now, that it's sometimes a challenge to see how we'll fit everything in along with "normal" summer activities!



Sylvia Moran and the Transition Team have hit the ground running. As you will see elsewhere in this issue of The Quest, we will open up the "Holy Cow" Survey on June 1st. The Transition Team will be engaging the Congregation in several activities over the next several weeks, but the most important thing right now is for us all to promptly and thoughtfully respond to the Survey in a timely manner. We need responses from ALL members (not just one per household) to get an accurate reflection of your true feelings and expectations about our church. Once the responses are in, the Team and Council will meet virtually with the consultant to understand the results. Following that meeting, the Team (Sylvia Moran, Matthew Andersen, Tammy Breene, Nan Lem, Craig Swanson, Helen Wolfe, and Rob Coffman) will break up and meet in small groups to engage in Appreciative Inquiry with members of our Holy

Cross family. This exercise (along with the Team's research) will enable them to create our Ministry Site Profile (MSP). The MSP is essentially our "resume" for the outside world, and, especially possible candidates to see if they think there's a good fit for them at Holy Cross. You may recall we went through this process during our last pastoral search, so the process is somewhat familiar to us this time around; however, there have been lots of changes here at Holy Cross, so we cannot take any shortcuts if we want the best possible outcome. As I mentioned last month, we have set ourselves an ambitious goal of completing this process before the holidays, so we'll need an "all hands on deck" response this summer. While the Holy Spirit will lead us and our next pastor on a timetable not of our making, we need to do all that we can to facilitate an accelerated, efficient, and complete process ensuring we are ready when the Holy Spirit wants and needs us to be.

One of the things we've noticed is that we need to "up our game" in social media. Anyone with skills/interest in this important area is encouraged to contact our VP, Cara Swanson Papenheim. If you just want to work on our technological infrastructure, please contact me.

Pastor Mark Cole is settling in as our Interim Pastor. It's refreshing to see our entire professional staff at full strength once again. The staff is bringing him up to speed quickly and educating him on our policies, practices, and special quirks! They are working well together.




We've had a recurring problem of some apparently homeless people camping in the woods adjacent to our church. Working with Pastor Luis, we've attempted to provide services and transportation to Embry Rucker. However, at least one individual has a history of becoming violent, and is no longer welcome at the shelter. It is a fine balance that we need to strike, because we want to tangibly demonstrate the love of Christ, but we don't want to endanger either members or staff. Tonya Elliott and her Outreach Team will be preparing gift bags of toiletries, non-perishable foods, etc., along with bi-lingual directions on how to avail themselves of resources at Link. Herndon Police and social service professionals have advised us not to hand out money directly, so we request that members refrain from doing so. We hope to have the gift bags available soon so that we can respond with compassion without endangering anyone.

I look forward to seeing where the Holy Spirit leads us as we seek to live and serve as Christ intended!

Last month's message was all about my girl Tay Tay and the amazing effects of committing to cause through music and emotion. As June is the most popular month of the year for weddings in the United States, I focus on a different kind of commitment. (*Disclaimer: I am not, nor claim to be, an expert on marriage, and fortunately, that is not what this is about*).

In real life, my official title is Director of Events, but what many of you may not know is my hotel hosts over 90 weddings each year. Real life Wedding Planning is a far cry from the JLo movie portrayal of sunshine and roses, it's about navigating a couple, their parents, thousands of Pinterest pages, and the realities of a budget through some of the most stressful decision making of their lives. Similarly, real life marriages and real life weddings are not the same thing. In



2023 there were just over a million real life marriage licenses issued in America, and mine was one of them. Being around weddings all the time should make being a bride/planner easy, it did not- in reality, professional planner or not, a wedding will take control of your life for the duration of the planning process. Marriage, however, *is* your life and takes both commitment and dedication.

Commitment and dedication are two things needed for any major life choice: buy a house or car, lose weight, change jobs etc, and as we are exiting the season of our Lord's Ascension, we are all reminded of the commitment and dedication that is required to receive the gifts of our faith. Fortunately for us Lutherans, this dedication is relatively "easy" when compared to marriage: believe in Jesus and you will go to heaven.

Commitment and dedication are two things that have never been lacking at Holy Cross, and as we continue to find ways to improve the financial position of the church, more opportunities for new calls for commitments await. In April, we saw the first month without a big red number at the bottom of the balance sheet since the budget was



adopted in November last year, attendance at our single service is averaging just over 60 people weekly, and our confirmation candidates are actively serving during worship. In the coming months our transition team will ask you to dedicate your time to thoughtfully share your feedback via survey and the church council will make good on their commitments to have open discussion about the Sunday worship schedule. As the resident millennial of your church council, I am committed to expanding our reach of younger age groups and on social media platforms and we are seeking assistance and dedication from those who have an interest in such a way, if this is you, please reach out.



OUTREACH

In 1913, a Polish peasant teenaged girl, Bronislava, was sent by her family to the US, hoping she would have a chance at a better life. She married soon after arriving in the US and they settled in a suburb of Buffalo, NY. The Idziak family grew, 14 of them lived in a tiny 6 room house. The local church was a source of support



especially during the depression. The family thrived, and the 12 children grew up and went on to live full lives having lots of kids of their own. This is part of my family's story. My 32 first cousins and I all benefited from the caring, compassionate, generosity of a little church in Buffalo, NY.

My family's journey was in the forefront of my mind as we served 25 men at Lunch for the Soul on May 1. I was humbled by the sincere gratitude each person expressed as we dished out a delicious meal. I thought about how hard it is not to speak the language (my grandmother did not speak one word of English) and have to work long hours to make ends meet. It filled me with joy to know that we helped 25 people see that they live in a

caring community. The most exciting thing is that this is only one of the ministries that HCLC provides to the community, and I can't wait to learn more about each of these ministries.

Lunch for the Soul was my first official duty as the Chair of the Outreach Committee. I took over from Vivian Jefferson on May 1st, so you know I have big shoes to fill. With the help of the other Council Members, the countless volunteers who are plugged into several well-oiled ministries that serve our community, and the congregation, I know we can continue the mission of service to others.

Bring your offering with you to worship service at 10 am. You can also mail a check donation to the church (Holy Cross Lutheran Church, 1090 Sterling Road, Herndon, VA 20170)

There are three ways to give when you're not in the sanctuary:

- To give online, simply go to our secure website and click "Donate" to set up an automatic donation plan.
- 2. Download the free Vanco Mobile app. Once it's downloaded, you can use our Invite code, 24A7NT to ensure you are linked to the correct church, and login with your current Vanco credentials (whether from the GivePlus app or our website's Donation page. If you do not have an account, you will be prompted to set one up. An even easier method of sending a single or recurring check donation to the church is by using Bill Pay with your bank or credit union online account or mobile app. Those payments are guaranteed and are shown in your bank or credit union records. Also, there is no fee to you or to the church.
- 3. Lastly, you can scan the QR code:
